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AN URBAN ENGAGED UNIVERSITY

We are Vrije Universiteit Brussel (VUB). For more than 190 years, we have been committed to providing answers to the challenges of tomorrow. How do we achieve this? With excellent scientific research, high-quality education and a strong social drive. We're embedded in Brussels as an urban engaged university, and in Europe as a member of the European university network EUTOPIA, where, together, 10 like-minded universities aim to build a unique and daring alliance of transformative and engaged institutions.



In June 2019, the European Commission selected the EUTOPIA alliance as one of the 17 projects that will shape the 'European University' of the future: an open and multicultural superuniversity. What began as an initiative by six founding members, grew into the alliance we know today. It connects some 300,000 students, 70,000 staff and over 100,000 international alumni across 874 research domains. The close cooperation within EUTOPIA allows the entire VUB community to participate in various international opportunities.

UNLIMITED AMBITION, CLOSE TIES

Brussels and VUB exude a cosmopolitan atmosphere, as every year, students from around 150 countries come to study with us. Here, they will find themselves in a truly inspiring international learning environment. Additionally, as VUB cooperates with higher education institutions across Belgium and around the world, students benefit from the wealth of opportunities to study or do an internship in Belgium or abroad as part of their studies.

THE 'V' OF VUB

Why is the Vrije Universiteit Brussel (literally translated as 'Free University of Brussels') not just the Universiteit Brussel ('University of Brussels')? There is a good reason for this. The 'V' in VUB stands for the Dutch word, 'vrijheid', meaning 'freedom', and dates back to 1834, when the universities were controlled by religion and government. Advocates for open intellectual debate went on to establish the VUB as a beacon of independent enquiry, separate from any external authority or influence.

Equality, openness and tolerance are at the core of our humanistic vision. We consider a person's worldview, including religion, to be a personal choice within the private sphere: we respect it, but we do not facilitate it. We support our students. We help them develop into autonomous, responsible and critical-thinking world citizens. Our focus is on high-quality teaching, based on open research and outstanding science.

A BRIEF LOOK BACK

The history of VUB is inextricably linked to the history of Belgium. After the revolution of 1830, a young Belgium established a progressive constitution that enshrined the principle of freedom of education, virtually unheard of at the time. The bishops immediately seized upon this principle to establish a Catholic University in Mechelen as early as 1834. In doing so, they took the monopoly of university education into their hands, thereby condemning freedom of press, opinion and ethics. In this context, in April 1834, the Brussels lawyer and politician Pierre-Théodore Verhaegen, along with Auguste Baron, spearheaded the fundraising campaign for a new educational institution. On 20 November 1834,

the Université libre de Belgique (ULB) was born. The new university's desire to be independent from both state and church was not well received, and for 12 years, it survived solely thanks to private donations and support from the city.

SAME FREE THINKING, DIFFERENT LANGUAGE

When ULB was founded, the Flemish community constituted a majority in Brussels, representing 60% of the city's inhabitants. Despite this, Dutch was regarded as the language of the working class, while French was the language spoken by the elite. Up until the early 1900s, the university's curriculum was given solely in French. During the 1880s, the ULB experienced a linguistic conflict that led to the introduction of the first Dutch-taught course in 1890. However, as the Dutch-speaking community in Belgium sought greater recognition (known as the "Flemish Movement"), the Faculty of Law started offering some classes in both French and Dutch in 1935, culminating in a comprehensive programme offering in Dutch by 1963.

In the aftermath of the May 1968 left wing protests in Paris, students across Europe took to the streets, calling for educational reform and public participation. Soon after, on 13 June 1969, the Coordinating Committee of the Dutchspeaking University Community was founded,

made up of students, professors and, later, staff and assistants. Extensive discussions failed to bring about an acceptable structure within ULB, and the political decision was made to separate the ULB into two legally, administratively, and scientifically distinct sister universities, based on the Belgian Parliament act of 28 May 1970. And so, the VUB was recognised as a university, with new structures and campus.

Today, the VUB is a vibrant community with more than 23,000 students coming from 150 different countries, enrolled in over 150 study programmes. It's supported by a dedicated team of over 4,000 staff members who are committed to the university's mission every day. Our university boasts a network of over 80,000 alumni, spanning 50 generations. These alumni are making their mark globally as enterprising innovators, critical thinkers, and active world citizens. What's in it for you?

SHAPING THINKERS AND DOERS

At the VUB, you, as a student, are the focal point. This human-centred approach stems from our humanistic roots. As an institution of higher education, our primary aim is to impart knowledge. However, we also encourage students to question, explore, and conduct independent research. At VUB, we empower you to forge your own academic journey, encourage critical thinking and enable you to form independent opinions.



VUB IN FIGURES



BELGIUM'S POLITICAL STRUCTURE

Belgium is a federal state, composed of three communities and three regions, each with their own government. The VUB falls under the remit of the Flemish government. It has devolved powers and is responsible for education, research, innovation, and other areas, while the federal government has responsibility over visa applications.



STUDYING AT A RESEARCH UNIVERSITY IN BELGIUM

The **Belgian higher education system** is known worldwide for its excellent quality and high standards. Universities offer a range of academic programmes, including bachelor's degrees, master's degrees, advanced master's degrees, PhDs, and postgraduate certificates.

Academic bachelor's degrees (180 ECTS) provide a strong theoretical foundation and prepare students for further studies at master's level.

Master's degrees (60-120 ECTS) have a strong emphasis on advanced scientific knowledge, and research competencies.

Advanced master's degrees (60-120 ECTS) offer specialised training, often in areas aligned with the university's top research fields. These programmes are designed for students who have already completed an initial master's degree (or equivalent) and seek further specialisation.

WHAT IS AN ECTS?

Our higher education system follows the European Higher Education Area standards, using the ECTS credit system. A year of full-time study typically amounts to 60 ECTS credits. 1 ECTS corresponds to 25-30 hours of teaching, learning and evaluation activities.

EMBRACING INTERDISCIPLINARITY

At VUB, your academic journey is a dynamic blend of mandatory courses, profile courses, and elective modules, designed to enrich your expertise. Alongside your core subjects, you have the freedom to choose specialisation subjects, enabling you to delve deeper into your field or broaden your knowledge.

VUB promotes interdisciplinary education to equip students with the tools to navigate complexity. Through interdisciplinary approaches, students develop critical thinking skills, engage in collaborative problem-solving, and embrace varying perspectives, and foster a deeper understanding of multifaceted issues.

PREPARATION FOR PROFESSIONAL CAREERS

VUB ensures that students are well-prepared for their future careers by equipping them with both academic and professional competencies. Alongside academic knowledge, students acquire practical and communicative skills, teamwork abilities, problem-solving techniques, and innovative thinking capabilities. Through practice-oriented course units and internships, students receive feedback from teachers, peers, and professionals, fostering confidence and success in their careers.

FOSTERING AUTONOMY AND INDIVIDUALITY

VUB empowers students to take ownership of their learning journey, encouraging autonomy and self-regulation. By providing opportunities for personalised learning paths, the university nurtures students' unique talents, ideas, and ambitions. Supported by a culture of openness and mentorship, students are encouraged to embrace their individuality and contribute meaningfully to society.

STUDYING ABROAD

SUMMER AND WINTER SCHOOLS

Summer and winter schools are short courses of one or two weeks organised during the school breaks. Many of these courses allow you to earn credits and are a great opportunity to get a glimpse of a study destination.

As a VUB-student you can also join the summer schools organised by partner universities.

LANGUAGE LEARNING

As a VUB student, you can check out the Academic Centre for Language Education (ACTO) and the Centre for Adult Education (CVO) Semper for language courses, tailored workshops and individual language support.

During the academic year, Language Tables are organised on certain weekdays during the academic year in the student restaurant on the main campus. Lunchtime is the perfect moment to practice your language skills in a relaxed environment with other learners and native speakers, and to meet new people.

WORKING IN BELGIUM AFTER YOUR STUDIES

EEA nationals and non-EEA nationals with a valid residence permit in Belgium can search for jobs or work as self-employed persons just like Belgian citizens.

Working as a highly qualified person is more flexible for non-EEA nationals via the **professional orientation year**. This means that you get up to 12 months to search for a job in Belgium or to carry out an independent activity. More information on www.vub.be/en/professional-orientation-year.

MORE THAN CHOCOLATE



You can request student housing along with your programme application, in the same tool. Applications can be submitted between 15 November and 1 May.

For those studying at the VUB Health Campus, Jet Upkot offers accommodation nearby. Alternatively, you can choose a private room through Brik, ensuring quality and peace of mind. With Brik's portfolio of 5,000 rooms, regularly inspected and all landlords registered, quality is assured. Plus, Brik provides support for any issues during your rental period, collaborating closely with VUB.

FOOD

HEALTH

overcoming fears, and enhancing motivation. It is also possible to make appointments with a general practitioner, physiotherapist or dentist.

STUDY GUIDANCE

The VUB Study Guidance Centre (SBC) is there to give your study success a boost. You can see them with questions related to your study progress at every stage of your educational career. A motivated and experienced team will provide you with custom-made guidance. This can be done individually or in groups.

UNIVERSITY LIBRARY AND STUDY SPACES

The VUB University Library offers an extensive collection of newspapers, books and periodicals, in both paper and electronic format. The staff can help you with searching, processing and referring to academic sources. The reading rooms are freely accessible and provide a wide range of printed literature, as well as with copying and scanning facilities. Study spaces are available in the library or in the study guidance centre.

CAREER CENTRE

While pursuing your studies, VUB offers ample support to kick-start your professional journey. Our career coaching includes support in creating a strong CV, exploring job opportunities, and building a professional network. Workshops cover various topics related to job searching and career development.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS AND APPLICATION

Students who do not possess a Flemish diploma need to submit an online application. The Student Administration department and the faculty's selection committee will process and screen the application.

ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS

BACHELOR'S PROGRAMMES

You need a **secondary school diploma** that gives you access to a bachelor's degree in your home country. Certain diplomas are deemed equivalent to a Flemish one and grant direct access. If you have a NARIC diploma, you can upload this along with the other required documents.

(ADVANCED) MASTER'S PROGRAMMES

The general requirement is that you need a **bachelor's degree (or equivalent)** in a relevant field.

When applying for an advanced master, you need a **master's degree (or equivalent)**.

REQUIRED DOCUMENTS

BACHELOR'S PROGRAMME

Students with a secondary school diploma deemed equivalent to a Flemish one:

- ID card (EEA country) or passport (all countries)
- Recent picture for your student card
- Secondary school diploma*
- Transcript of records*
- Proof of language proficiency

Students with a different secondary degree:

- all of the documents mentioned above +
- Motivational letter

(ADVANCED) MASTER'S PROGRAMME

General required documents:

- ID card (EEA country) or passport (all countries)
- Recent picture for your student card
- Higher Education diploma*
- Transcript of records*
- Proof of language proficiency

Extra documents for each programme:

- all of the documents mentioned above +
- Motivational letter
- Two recommendation letters**

WHAT IF I DID NOT YET OBTAIN MY DIPLOMA?

Final year students who haven't obtained their diploma, should submit their **enrolment certificate**. This official document needs to confirm your current enrolment in the final year, expected graduation date and title of the diploma you will obtain.

^{*}We need the original as well as a **certified translation,** if these documents are not in English, Dutch, French or German. The documents do not need to be legalised.

^{**}Check your programme's admission requirements to see if these apply to you.

LANGUAGE REQUIREMENTS

There are English language requirements you must meet to receive admission. You can provide proof of sufficient knowledge of English as the language of instruction by meeting one of **the following criteria**:

- Having a diploma from a secondary school or higher education institution where English was the sole language of instruction;
- Having successfully completed one of the following language proficiency tests corresponding to the Common European Framework of Reference with min. level B2: TOEFL iBT (home edition) with min. level: 79; IELTS (online) with min. level: academic module 6.5; ITACE with min. level: B2, or Cambridge English Qualification Scale with min. level: 170.

Certificates and other proof of language tests must not pre-date the first enrolment by more than five years. Students applying for a scholarship might need to meet a higher level of English proficiency.

These are the general admission requirements. Each programme can have its own specific requirements. You can consult the respective programme pages for more details on www.vub.be/en/programmes.

APPLICATION DEADLINES

Prospective students applying on the basis of a foreign diploma are advised to apply as soon as possible, even if they have not yet obtained their diploma.

- Students who require a visa (typically non-EEA nationals) must apply before 1 April.
- Students who do not require a visa must apply before 1 August.

Certain (advanced) master's programmes may have different application deadlines and/or conduct a formal pre-admission through another platform. Make sure you check the deadlines and admission procedure applicable to your programme of interest. More information on www.vub.be/en/apply.

ENROLMENT

The Student Administration department needs to verify the authenticity of your prior degree(s), on the basis of which you were admitted to study at VUB. Diplomas can be verified electronically through official online platforms or via email sent by the registrar of the awarding institution. More information on www.vub.be/en/diploma-verification.

Once your diploma has been verified you will be able to sign the study contract, enrol and commit to pay the tuition fee.

VISA

Once your application has been approved, you will receive the confirmation via email. Students in need of a visa will receive the relevant documents to start the visa application.

Non-EEA nationals must apply for a **type D visa** to study in Belgium. The application is submitted to the Belgian diplomatic representation in your country of residence. The procedures for obtaining a visa can vary depending on your nationality, duration of the stay and reason for the stay. More information on **www.vub.be/en/preparing-your-stay**.

SUFFICIENT FINANCIAL MEANS


When applying for a student visa, you need to prove that you have sufficient financial means to cover your living expenses, studies and other costs. There are several ways to do this, including by opening a **blocked** account.

BLOCKED ACCOUNT

Students deposit the required amount on a yearly basis, that is meant to cover the expected living expenses (€1,000/month) to a VUB bank account, after which a solvency certificate is issued. The solvency certificate is used to prove sufficient financial means as part of the visa application procedure. During the academic year, students receive monthly instalments from this blocked account on their Belgian bank account.

HEALTH INSURANCE

All individuals residing in Belgium are required, by law, to have health insurance. EEA nationals can use their **European Health Insurance Card**, some non-EEA nationals are covered by their home country, and other students will have to get health insurance upon their arrival in Belgium.



LEARN MORE ABOUT VUB AND ITS PROGRAMMES

FINANCIAL ARRANGEMENTS

Secure sufficient financial resources to support your study and living costs. Identify and apply for loans/grants/scholarships if needed.

HOUSING ARRANGEMENTS

Look for on-campus or private accommodation. **VUB housing application deadline: 1 May**

ORIENTATION WEEK

Arrive before 16 September to engage in fun activities and familiarise yourself with the VUB, Brussels and meet fellow students.

START OF CLASSES

Classes start in the 4th week of September.

Students in the Bruface master's programmes start in the 3rd week of September.

ACCESS TO EXCELLENT AND AFFORDABLE EDUCATION

TUITION FEES

All accredited bachelor's and master's programmes at the VUB are subsidised by the Flemish government, meaning students only have to pay a small fraction of the actual cost of education, and this is for students from all over the world. The tuition fee depends on your programme of interest and your nationality. The table below shows the average tuition fees. There are exceptions which you can find on www.vub.be/en/tuition-fees.
