





Mobility of higher education students and staff supported by internal policy funds (KA131-HED)

The Mobility of higher education students and staff supported by internal policy funds, also known within the Erasmus+ framework as KA131-HED, is a vital component of the programme aimed at promoting international cooperation, mobility, and excellence in higher education institutions across Europe and beyond. The KA131-HED provides funding to higher education institutions to support the mobility of both students and staff members within the institution's own internal policies. It enables universities to facilitate exchanges of students and staff members for study, teaching, training, and professional development purposes without the need for formal agreements with partner institutions.

KA131-HED provides funding to higher education institutions to support the mobility of both students and staff members **within the institution's own internal policies**. It enables universities to facilitate exchanges of students and staff members for study, teaching, training, and professional development purposes without the need for formal agreements with partner institutions.

The KA131-HED funding enables higher education institutions to offer a wide range of opportunities for mobility, including:

- Student Mobility eligible students undertake periods of study or traineeships abroad within their own institution's network. They have an opportunity to enrich their academic experience by studying at a different department or campus within their university, gaining exposure to diverse teaching methods, research facilities, and academic cultures.
- Staff Mobility for Teaching eligible academic staff members can undertake teaching assignments at partner departments or campuses within their institution. This allows for the exchange of expertise, sharing of best practices, and enhancement of teaching methodologies. It also fosters collaboration between faculty members and promotes the internationalisation of the curriculum.
- Staff Mobility for Training eligible non-academic



staff members, including administrative, managerial, and technical personnel, can participate in training activities **at partner departments or campuses**. This offers opportunities for professional development, skill enhancement, and knowledge exchange, ultimately contributing to the overall efficiency and effectiveness of university operations.





Mobility of higher education students and staff supported by external policy funds (KA171-HED)

The KA171-HED (KA171) mobility of higher education students and staff supported by external policy funds projects is a vital aspect of the Erasmus+ Programme, facilitating international mobility within higher education institutions through external sources of funding. This initiative allows universities to collaborate with external partners, such as government agencies, foundations, or private organizations, to support mobility initiatives for students and staff.

The KA171 projects rely on external policy funds provided by governmental or non-governmental organizations, which are dedicated to promoting internationalisation, education,

or research. These funds may be allocated specifically for supporting mobility programs within higher education institutions, enabling universities to expand their international cooperation efforts.

- Collaborative Partnerships: Universities participating in KA171 projects often collaborate with external partners to design and implement mobility initiatives. This may involve working closely with government agencies, educational foundations, or industry partners to secure funding, develop mobility programs, and coordinate logistical support for participants.
- Targeted Mobility Initiatives: KA171 projects focus on specific target groups or thematic areas based on the priorities of the external funding sources. For example, projects may aim to support mobility for students and staff from underrepresented groups, promote mobility in specific academic disciplines or research fields, or address regional development objectives through international cooperation.
- Enhanced Opportunities: External policy funds enable universities to enhance the scope and scale of their mobility initiatives, providing additional resources for scholarships, travel grants, accommodation, and other support services. This allows a greater number of students and staff to participate in international mobility experiences, thereby enriching their academic, professional, and personal development.



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- **Impact and Sustainability:** KA171 projects contribute to the overall impact and sustainability of internationalisation efforts within higher education institutions. By leveraging external policy funds, universities can create sustainable frameworks for supporting mobility initiatives over the long term, ensuring that international cooperation remains a key priority in their institutional strategies.
- Monitoring and Evaluation: Like all Erasmus+ projects, KA171 projects are subject to monitoring and evaluation to assess their effectiveness, impact, and compliance with program objectives. Universities are required to report on the outcomes of their mobility initiatives, including the number of participants, mobility destinations, and achievements in terms of learning outcomes and professional development.

Students and staff can take advantage of the opportunity of foreign exchange within the Erasmus KA171 programme. It is a development of the European Union's Erasmus+ educational programme. The programme has been implemented at AGH University since 2015. Until now 380 mobilities have been carried out under the programme including 88 student mobilities and 292 staff mobilities.





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How to Apply - Student Mobility for Erasmus+ KA131 & KA171 Programme

If you would like to visit AGH University of Krakow (PL KRAKOW02) as part of one of the Erasmus+ Student mobility Programmes (KA131 or KA171), here are the steps you need to follow:

Deadlines!

31 May - for the winter semester (October-February) or for the whole academic year 15 November - for the summer semester (March - June)

04 **Register and Submission**

We will then ask you to register in our system and submit application documents. We will discuss your plans, help you arrange your preliminary selection of courses and assign you an Academic Supervisor

05 **Final Step**

Finally if all is in order you will be asked to send us your Learning Agreement and we will issue a Letter of Acceptance for you

Green travel

Additional Support for People with Fewer Opportunities*

All Higher Education Institutions which are part of the Erasmus+ Programme have signed the Erasmus Charter for Higher Education, and are committed to ensure equal access and opportunities to participants from all backgrounds. Encouraging students to explore the Additional Support for People with Fewer Opportunities ensures that everyone can benefit from the enriching experiences offered by Erasmus+, regardless of their background or circumstances.

The Erasmus+ Programme foresees a top-up grant of up to 250 EUR/month (depending on the length of stay) for People with Fewer Opportunities. It reinforces the program's commitment to equity, diversity, and inclusion.

'Students helping students' -Erasmus Student Network

The Erasmus Student Network (ESN) serves as the first line of support for students coming to Krakow under the Erasmus+ Programme. This active student network provides incoming Erasmus+ students with practical help and advice, aiding their adaption at the AGH University and in the city of Krakow.

Main features of the network include:

- **Buddy Programme** a dedicated person assigned to new Erasmus+ student who can; pick them up from the airport, help with accommodation, guide through the AGH University Campus and Krakow, be an emergency contact.
- Welcome Month including Orientation Week a whole month (with the greatest intensity in the first week) of events at the start of each semester aiming to help new Erasmus+ students to get to know each other at the start of their Erasmus+ journey. The events include activities such as; city games, bonfire nights, go karting, laser tag, day trips, board game nights, clubbing and many more. The possibilities are endless!
- **Farewell Party** a Final Party at the end of each semester to summarise the semester and celebrate the achievements of Erasmus+ students.

ESN organises several other projects and initiatives throughout the year:

- ESN Tandem weekly language meeting followed by a themed party
- Exchange Zone regular cultural exchange meeting, where Erasmus+ students can present information about their country, teach fellow students some useful phrases in their mother tongue and share some traditional foods
- **Discover Europe** a photography competition in three categories; people, architecture and nature
- National Erasmus Games a whole of Poland ESN sports competition in futsal, basketball and volleyball. The competition is divided into three levels: local, national and international
- ESN Gift as part of this project, departing Erasmus+ students can leave some items they no longer need (such as pots, forks, spoons, cups, plates etc.) at the ESN Office for the incoming Erasmus+ students to pick up and use during their stay in Krakow
- International/Christmas Dinner an event where students bring homemade dishes representing their national cuisines. It's a chance to share and taste a diverse array of foods from different cultures, promoting cultural exchange and community



ESN also pays special attention to students with specific needs, actively supporting them to feel included as part of the AGH University's Erasmus+ community.

All members of the network can apply for the ESN membership card, which serves as proof of membership in the ESN Poland Association. This card also offers a variety of discounts at cafes, restaurants, travel services, and other activities in Krakow and worldwide including Ryanair, FlixBus or Spotahome. <u>https://esncard.org</u>

Networking Sessions: aiming to build meaningful connections with peers from international institutions, share experiences, discuss challenges, and explore potential partnerships.


Cultural Experiences: celebrating the diversity of our global community including local excursions, cultural performances, and international cuisine.

Useful Information during your stay in Krakow

AGH University Campus

Our campus is unique and one of a kind in Poland, as it encompasses all teaching and research facilities, main faculty offices, administrative buildings, and student organisations, all situated within one district of the city. The student campus boasts modern amenities including a football pitch, volleyball and basketball courts with artificial surfaces, and tennis courts. The modern AGH University swimming pool is one of the highlights of the campus.



Welcome to AGH UST Mobile application

is a useful tool for all international students that arrive at a campus for the first time. Its main goal is to help students move around the AGH University Campus and provide them with all necessary information, including locations of AGH University premises (faculties,

dormitories, sports facilities, student clubs, copy centres, canteens and many more).

Accommodation

In terms of location, the AGH University of Krakow is centralised and all faculties' buildings are situated within 40ha in a district called Krowodrza. The AGH University Student Campus is only a 15-minute walk between the Main Building and the Krakow Main Square. If you rent a flat near the Campus, you will be able to reach the university within a couple of minutes on foot.

AGH University Student Campus

The AGH University Student Campus provides accommodation for medium and long term stays (up to 1 year) for international students and visiting staff Since the demand is much higher than the capacity, please contact the AGH University Student Campus as early as possible:

Private flat/apartment

Many students in Krakow opt to live in private flats, either sharing with others or living on their own. You can search for a flat or apartment on webistes such as OLX and Otodom.





Living costs and services

In comparison to other European cities, Kraków is a relatively inexpensive place to live and study - a student can get by on around 600 euros per month. **1 EURO = around 4.3 zloty PLN Monthly expenses (average cost):**

- rent in a shared flat (or dormitory) at the AGH University Campus – 100-150 euros;
- food 200 euros;
- transportation 20 euros;
- mobile phone/Internet/TV 30 euros;
- study materials 50 euros;
- other expenses (leisure/entertainment) 100 euros.

Examples of some other selected prices:

- bread (1 loaf) 2 euro;
- milk (1 litre) 0.7 euro;
- lunch in a canteen 5 euros;
- coffee in a café 2-3 euros;
- cinema ticket 6 euros.



Student Discounts:

All students in Poland receive 50% discount on public transportation and 51% on long-distance trains. Student discount is also offered at majority of cinemas, museums, some restaurants and cafes. Make sure to organize your Student ID as soon as you arrive so that you can take advantage of all discounts immediately.
